# Asia's Hope provides family-style, community-based care for the world's most vulnerable kids.

## Family-Style

Research shows what we all know intuitively: kids don't belong in *institutions*. But they thrive in stable, loving *families*. And Asia's Hope's family-style model is **uniquely successful in transforming the lives of orphaned children.**

At Asia's Hope, each child or sibling group is placed in one of our families, under the care of a married mom and dad, who will stay with them *throughout their entire childhood*.

We don't "age out" kids when they turn 16 or 18; we offer all of our children the opportunity to *remain in our care* while they attend university or vocational training, paid for by our generous supporters.

## Community-Based

We empower, trust and *fund* local, indigenous leadership. That means that in each of the countries in which we work, every staff person — from the night watchman to the national director, from the home parents to the finance personnel — are *from* the country they serve. **All of our best ideas — including our family-style care model — are developed locally.**

## World's Most Vulnerable Kids

Long-term outcomes for orphaned kids are generally very poor: few will receive an education, and many will perpetuate the cycle of desperation, orphaning their own children through death, abandonment, imprisonment or forced migration.

Without parental protection and provision, **orphaned and vulnerable children live every day at risk** of being neglected, abused and exploited.

# A uniquely successful model, capable of transforming orphan care

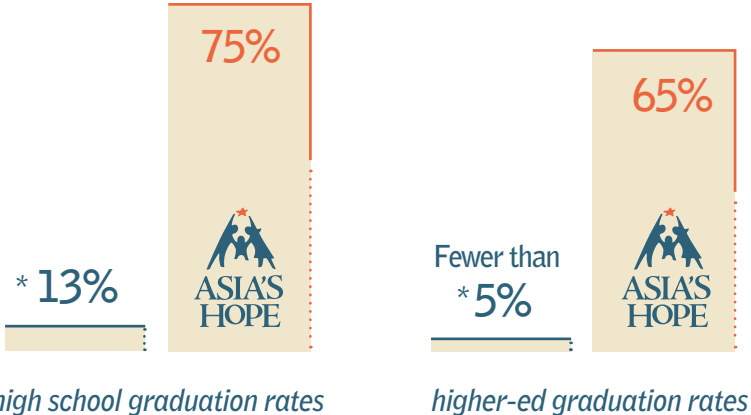
## Uniquely Successful Model

Kids at Asia's Hope don't just survive, they thrive. Most of them come to us scared, traumatized and *significantly behind* in terms of education and emotional development. But thanks to the love of their new families *and* the educational and material resources provided by supporters and partners from around the world, our kids heal and grow, and develop the skills they need to live successful, independent lives.

In the *key metric of lifetime educational attainment*, **our kids are obliterating expectations**. For example, in Cambodia, Thailand and India, only about 13% of children from poor families can expect to graduate grade 12.

At Asia's Hope, **nearly 75% of our kids attain a high school diploma**. And **more than 65% of all Asia's Hope kids graduate university or complete a post-secondary vocational training program**.

Compared to other *\*poor children in the countries we serve*, our kids are achieving much higher rates of academic success.





## Transforming Orphan Care

Other orphan care providers have taken notice of *our* kids' extraordinarily high rates of success, as have local governments and non-governmental organizations.

We believe that God has called us to be not only *passionate voices* for orphaned kids, but *tireless advocates* for **family-style, community-based models of care.**

So we're committed to taking what we've learned over our first two decades — and what we're learning today — and sharing it with others who, like us, are committed to following God's command to "*Learn to do good; seek justice, correct oppression; and bring justice to the orphan.*" (Isaiah 1:17)

Now that we've entered our third decade of ministry, we're more eager than ever to invest in the curricula, programs, and staffing we'll need to *train others around the world* in the model we've found to be so successful in Cambodia, Thailand and India.

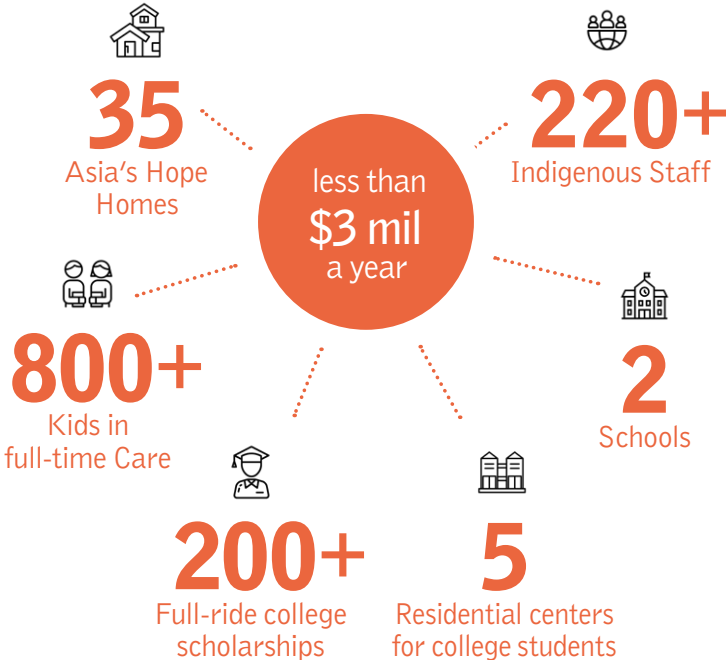
